

January 12, 2022 National Policy Survey

Summary: Researchers at the University of South Florida – in collaboration with researchers at Florida International University – conducted a national survey of 1,000 eligible voters to measure public opinion on a variety of current policy issues. The results presented in this report address the COVID-19 pandemic, the most important issues facing the United States today, and presidential job approval. The survey included a representative sample of Americans, fielded between January 6th and 10th, 2022. Topline results are reported below with a confidence level of 95% and a margin of error +/- 3.1.

Amid the Omicron surge, Americans still view COVID-19 as the most important issue facing the country. A plurality of respondents (32.5%) say that the COVID-19 pandemic is the most important issue facing the United States today. Comparatively, less than 15% said the same about the economy (14.4%) and inflation (7.1%). Three-quarters (74.2%) are either "somewhat" or "very concerned" about emerging variants of the virus.

Americans are divided on the issue of vaccine mandates, and most hold strong opinions on the matter. When asked about President Biden's proposed vaccine mandate, respondents were relatively divided, with 52.6% indicating some support for the proposal, and 47.4% opposing it. Overall opinions on the matter were quite strong, with roughly a third of respondents saying that they "strongly support" (35.2%) the measure, and a similar number (35.6%) saying that they "strongly oppose" it.

A majority of Americans would support a vaccine requirement for domestic air travel, though a third strongly oppose such measures. Among the survey respondents, 60.3% said that they would either "strongly" or "somewhat support" a policy that required all passengers on domestic flights in the United States to show proof of vaccination against COVID-19. In contrast, another 29.1% indicated that they "strongly oppose" such a policy.

Sharp partisan divisions persist when it comes to COVID-19. Republicans and Democrats differ significantly when it comes to COVID-19 mitigation and response policies. For example, 88.1% of Democrats voiced support for President Biden's proposed vaccine mandates, compared with only 35.6% of Republicans. Democrats are more likely to agree that measures such as mask wearing/social distancing are still necessary (94.4% compared to 49.9% of Republicans) and that vaccines have been effective in protecting Americans from the virus (83.5% compared to 41.0% of Republicans).



A majority of Americans expressed dissatisfaction with the President's handling of key issues.

Following recent trends, President Biden was found to have high disapproval ratings in several key areas, including his handling of the COVID-19 pandemic (51.8% disapprove), jobs and the economy (51.3%), immigration and border security (58.7%), foreign policy (52.2%), and his effectiveness at unifying Americans (54.4%).

Americans view the national debt and political polarization as being among the most significant threats to the country's future. A bipartisan majority (87.9%) indicated that the national debt is a significant threat the America's future. A similar majority (87.4%) said the same about rampant partisanship and political polarization. There was somewhat less agreement on issues such as climate change (73.5%), racism (73.3%) and inequality (69.7%).

Partisans have different concerns about the future. Republicans were most likely to view the national debt (93.9%) and foreign adversaries (90.0%) as significant threats to America's future, while Democrats were most likely to say the same about climate change (93.4%) and racism (91.8%).

Survey Information

1,000 eligible U.S. voters were surveyed via an online web-panel using Prodege MR, an industry leading market research provider. The survey was fielded from January 6th through 10th, and the results are reported with a 95% confidence level and a margin of error of +/- 3.1. Respondents were selected via a stratified, quota sampling approach to ensure a representative sample. Quotas for gender, age, race/ethnicity, and education were determined based on data from the U.S. Census Bureau's 2019 ACS survey. Quotas were stratified by Census region to ensure geographical representativeness.
