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Limited Access to Memory Care Services in Assisted Living Communities in Rural Florida

BACKGROUND

With 21% of its population aged 65 and older, the state of Florida has the largest percentage of older adults in the country. Of this population, over half a million people are living with Alzheimer's disease (AD). While most of these adults will try to age in place, many have to use long-term care services. The Alzheimer's Association estimates about 42% of people with AD using these services will live in an assisted living community (ALC).2 Florida has 3,090 ALCs and can advertise memory care services if they comply with state requirements for a safe environment, nursing supervision, and AD staff training. Because Florida has the highest percent of older adults, and almost half of its counties are rural,³ this policy brief explores the access to ALCs with memory care services in Florida.

STUDY METHOD

Data about the Florida ALCs were collected from the Florida Agency for Healthcare Administration (AHCA),* which has a legislative mandate, to provide information about ALCs and their services. For our analyses, we used the county-level addresses reported to AHCA for each ALC. Each county in Florida was then labeled as urban or rural based on the 2010 U.S. Census. A county is considered rural if there are 100 people or less per square mile.³ Additional data were collected from the Florida Department of Health that included information on the number of older adults residing

in each county in Florida, as well as the number of people with probable AD.¹

FINDINGS




Figure 1. Florida Counties With and Without Assisted Living Communities with Memory Care

There are 683 ALCs (22%) offering memory care services in Florida (see Figure 1). The 37 urban counties have more than 3.2 million adults that are 65 and older, with approximately 428,000 of these adults having probable AD. All 37 of these counties have at least one ALC, and a total of 666 (97.8%) ALCs have memory care services. The 30 rural counties of Florida account for almost 1 million people that are over the age of 65, with about 125,000 older adults having probable AD. However, there are no ALCs in nine rural counties (Dixie, Franklin, Gilchrist, Glades, Jefferson, Levy, Taylor, Union, and Wakulla). Additionally, Baker, Bradford, Calhoun, DeSoto, Gulf, Hamilton, Hardee, Hendry, Holmes, Jackson, Liberty, Monroe, Okeechobee, Suwanee, and Washington counties have at least one ALC, but none provide any memory care services.

Overall, 881,020 adults 65 and older, or 21.0% of Florida's older adult population, that reside within 24 (35.8%) counties have no access to an ALC with memory care services.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

The findings of this study indicate there is a clear need for ALC services within rural Florida, and a need for the state to promote the implementation of memory care services within the ALCs that are already in rural areas. Previous studies indicate that as people age, they are more likely to move out of urban areas into more rural settings,4 and one can expect the number of older adults in these communities to grow rapidly in the near future.⁵ Living in rural areas can exacerbate symptoms of AD as these adults are more likely to live alone with little social interaction, have lower levels of education, and have severe or complete impairment in their ability to do their activities of daily living. With Florida continuing to have the highest percent of older adults in the country, and the recent identification of AD as a top health priority in this state, it is essential that policy makers develop services for this clearly underserved population in an attempt to alleviate the associated burden.
