

FOR MSW PROGRAM Program Eligibility

In order to be eligible for the Project *iSED* program, a student must:

- Have been accepted into the MSW full-time Tampa Program students (non-advanced standing or advanced standing)
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent U.S. resident
- Have goals consistent with the program
- A strong interest in providing services to children with emotional and behavioral disorders in the school system

Application Process

All students accepted in the MSW full-time Tampa Program (non-advanced standing or advanced standing) are eligible to apply to participate in Project *iSED*. The MSW Tampa Program will distribute a Project *iSED* application form to each student during the first week of classes. Interested applicants should submit the completed application form, a letter of intent, and a current resume to Dr. Alison Salloum in the School of Social Work at the University of South Florida.

ABOUT PROJECT iSED

Project *iSED* aims to prepare 34 high-quality scholars to serve as either Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBAs) or School Social Workers (SWs) who can collaboratively design and deliver evidence-based instruction and intensive individualized interventions and supports (PBIS) in natural environments, classroom, and schools for school-aged children with severe emotional and behavioral disorders (EBD).



Advancing Interdisciplinary Services for Students with Severe Emotional and Behavioral Disorders

Using an interdisciplinary approach, the project will prepare the related services personnel to employ evidence-based practices and evaluation, foster family engagement and access to mental health counseling, and serve as home-school liaison. These related services personnel will be prepared to promote high expectations, use differentiated instruction, and improve the quality of behavior analytic and social work services for children with EBD who have high-intensity needs. This effort represents the collaboration between two programs, the Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) Master's Program and the Master's in Social Work (MSW) Program within the College of Behavioral and Community Sciences at the University of South Florida (USF) and partnerships with three Florida school districts (Hillsborough County Public Schools, Pasco County Schools, and Manatee County Schools).

FOR MSW PROGRAM Scholarship Support

- Paid tuition (in-state rate) for 3 semesters (Summer, Fall, and Spring of 2nd year in the MSW program)
- Out-of-state tuition waiver for non-Florida residents
- Stipends for 3 semesters (Summer, Fall, and Spring of 2nd year in the MSW program)
- Financial assistance for conference attendance

Program Requirements

Program *iSED* requires all MSW credit hours plus 6 credits in Positive Behavior Support. Beyond the master's degree in MSW, the Project *iSED* program students will be prepared to graduate with a Graduate Certificate in Positive Behavior Support. Features of the project include:

- Graduate Certificate Program in Positive Behavior Support
- Coordinated and supervised practicum
- Monthly seminars
- Summer Institute
- Florida Center for Inclusive Communities Trainee Program
- Case studies
- Portfolio development
- Conference participation

Upon exiting the program, all students receiving scholarships through this project are required to maintain eligible employment on a full-time or full-time equivalent basis and provide related services to children with disabilities in the school system for a period of two years for every one academic year for which assistance is received.
