WHAT YOU NEED

Foundations of Knowledge and Learning Curriculum (FKL)

- □ 3 credits of Fine Arts (visual arts, music, dance, theatre, and creative writing)
- 6 credits of <u>Humanities</u> (human civilizations, past & present, & their languages, literature, art, religion, & philosophy)
- □ 3 credits of <u>Human and Cultural Diversity in a Global Context (Diversity)</u> (Interrelations among global economic, political, environ. & social systems & create an awareness problems confronting nations)
- □ 6 credits of <u>Social and Behavioral Sciences</u> (study social groups, institutions, and organizations, and their context and study of human behavior) Note some majors may require EGN 3615. IT students have required classes.

Also, 3 credit hours of the *above* coursework must be completed in <u>Human Historical Context and Process</u> (HHCP). The courses noted with an asterisk (*) will meet both HHCP and the FKL area listed.

<u>Note</u>: First Year Students admitted fall 2015 or later must meet the State General Education (SGE) Core by taking one St. GenEd Social Science (SGES) and one St. GenEd Humanities (SGEH) that meets SGE requirements.

Gordon Rule (GR) Communication

- □ Six semester hours of coursework beyond English Composition I & II approved as Gordon Rule Communication
- Industrial Eng, Computer Eng and Computer Science have all 4 GR courses met with degree required courses.
 Other majors meet GR by taking ENC1101, ENC1102, ENC3246 and one more course.
- □ Exempt -- Any student entering the university with 60 or more hours is exempt from GR Communication.

ALREADY INCLUDED

Gordon Rule Computation:

✓ The math courses required for College of Engineering degrees meet this requirement fully.

The remaining FKL requirements are met with your degree requirements:

- ✓ 6 credit hours of English Composition, consisting of Composition I and Composition II (ENC 1101 counts as HHCP)
- ✓ 6 credit hours of Mathematics and Quantitative Reasoning
- ✓ 6 credit hours of natural <u>Science</u> (Physical and Life science, the life science is substituted with Chemistry or another science course for college of engineering students)

The EXIT (Capstone) requirements are also met with your degree requirements:

- √ Writing Intensive Capstone course (3 credit hours) is ENC 3246 Communication for Engineers
- ✓ <u>Capstone Experience</u> course (3 credit hours) is your senior design class (or Ethics for Comp Sci & Eng students)

Minimum Grade:

You must receive a minimum grade of "C-" in each course and an overall grade of 2.0 to fulfill any FKL requirement in either the core curriculum or the Capstone Experience. S/U grades are not acceptable.
