I am elated to report the Student Support Services Program (SSS) continues to contribute to the University of South Florida's preeminence. Most recently, SSS has a 97% one year persistence rate for its 2017 cohort, and 96% are in good academic standing. Our students include first-generation and limited income students who

face unique challenges to college completion. Yet, our students return to USF one year later at a higher rate than students who are from more traditional backgrounds. The SSS staff influences student experiences with specialized techniques and practices, including the SSS Living Learning Community, which provides a supportive environment, a sense of belonging, faculty in residence, and affordable living for our students. This department partners with various university entities and encourages our students to take advantage of all the resources USF has to offer, we also appreciate our community partnerships. Our students' academic performance and campus involvement is remarkable as demonstrated in this newsletter. SSS renders extraordinary student success stories, and we encourage you to celebrate these success stories with us.

Alexa Gonzalez is



Alexa is passionate about becoming a Pediatric Oncologist. She currently shadows Dr. Fernandez at Tampa General Hospital, who specializes in advanced heart failure (See photo below). She is a Committee Member of the Mini Dance Marathon Committee for the annual Bulls For Kids Dance Marathon at USF. This dance marathon raises thousands of dollars for the Shriners Hospital located on the USF campus. **Alexa dedicates herself** to Bulls For Kids because she has always been inclined to look after the young and for those who do not have the means to help themselves.

With the help of networking, doctors, and directors, Alexa started the first Dance Marathon at Nicklaus Children's Hospital in Broward County, which raises funds for children with terminal illnesses. After visiting Nicklaus Children's Hospital in the heart of Miami for the first time, Alexa was inspired to see children with IVs still smiling, playing, and dancing despite going through their process of chemotherapy. It was an impactful experience, and she found an opportunity to help by providing local schools the opportunity to host their individual Dance Marathons. Alexa says, "Within our first year we were able to raise over \$10k. This was the first act of service that made me truly want to serve children in my community by one day becoming a doctor. I have continued with this passion of serving children with illnesses with the largest student-run philanthropy, Bulls for Kids at the University of South Florida." Alexa is a firm believer of giving back to her community.

Currently, Alexa volunteers at the Moffitt Cancer Center. She views it as another act of service that has truly has made an impact in her life and reinforces her commitment to her goals. This volunteering experience has made her understand why she needs to **work even harder to one day serve** as a Pediatric Oncologist. She explains, "When I look back and ask myself who has shaped and influenced me to pursue my dream career of becoming a Pediatric Oncologist, I can say with no hesitation that it is all the patients at Nicklaus Children's Hospital, Shriners Hospital for Children, and the Moffitt Cancer Center."

Cultivating Leaders Who Serve





SSS Students are Global Citizens







In April, **Reba Garth** and **LaTosha Thomas** attended the Council for Opportunity in Education's (COE) **Grant Proposal Writing Workshop** in San Diego, CA. The Forum, led by seasoned Directors and COE staff, focused on enhancing program design by learning about different strategies and emphasizing how to incorporate required services. Participants weighed the strengths and limitations of various program approaches with colleagues from across the country.

LaTosha Thomas served on the planning committee for The National Student Success Conference (NSSC), led by Dr. Paul Dosal, Vice President of Student Success. Dr. Thomas also served on the USF committee for Student Loan Debt Reduction, led by Dr. Robert Bishop, Dean of the College of Engineering.

Roshanda Pinson attended the **Council for Opportunity in Education** (COE) professional development training on Legislation and Regulations in Kansas City, MO in April. The training is designed to assist TRIO personnel in learning the legislation and regulations that guide their programs. COE discussed the Legislation, specific TRIO regulations, and the Education Department Guidelines (EDGAR) OMB Uniform Cost Circulars. Reporting, evaluation, and budgeting were also discussed.

The conference emphasized the themes of Diversity, Innovation, Creativity, and Engagement.
